A MESSAGE FROM AMBER:



Ten years ago, President Barack Obama was re-elected, Lyft car-sharing service was launched, ExxonMobil was the largest company, and an early childhood collaboration, Elgin Partnership for Early Learning (EPEL), was established.

In 2011, community leaders gathered around a table for coffee in downtown Elgin to envision what a community would look like where "ALL" children had access to high-quality care, coordinated early childhood services, and support to enter Kindergarten prepared and ready to learn. The idea was that cross-sector partners would work collaboratively to create a community of

support and care with an outcome of thriving children and families. EPEL was formed as a collective impact organization to support our youngest children and their caregivers while working together as a community to address the opportunity and achievement gap as children enter Kindergarten.

EPEL's vision, "All children happy, healthy, and ready to learn," can not be achieved alone. As you see, after ten years, we have re-imagined our logo from fitting puzzle pieces (partners and services) together to overlapping circles with a child and caregiver in the center to represent building a connected community dedicated to helping young children thrive. EPEL's new logo reflects the partners overlapping support and services (Early Learning and Leadership, Health, and Family Leadership and Support) while always keeping children and family at the center of our discussions and goals. The person in the middle of the logo might be a parent, grandparent, educator, caregiver, neighbor, or community member supporting the journey from birth to Kindergarten for the child they are embracing.

I hope you will take a minute to reflect on our community's future, the children that are our future workforce, and where you or your organization fit into the circles of care in the first 2,000 days of a child's life. Join the movement and invest in the future.

CONNECTING AND MOBILIZING COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

EPEL and our partners have a plan to create a coordinated, high-quality early childhood system that will narrow the achievement gap for children entering Kindergarten.

Using a collective impact model, EPEL examines and works to build connected local systems with partners to create ways to impact capacity, to provide resources, early childhood initiatives, information, and support for families and providers of children under five years of age.

- With the City of Elgin and Alignment Collaborative for Education, early learning signs were installed in local parks to build Kindergarten readiness skills.
- With YWCA Elgin and Gail Borden Public Library, books and story time were added to 3 laundromats to promote early learning anywhere and everywhere.
- With mobile food pantries, books and resources were distributed to families while they waited.
- With partners, special topics were discussed at collaboration meetings.
- With many businesses, While You Wait Book
 Baskets were installed throughout the community
 so families could read while they waited.
- With School District U-46
 a common message (Talk,
 Play, Read, Do, & Write)
 was adopted so that all
 children starting at birth will
 build a strong foundation for
 learning during the critical
 first 2,000 days of early brain
 development.



FAMILY ENGAGEMENT


- 844-KID-INFO: Toll-free phone line to connect families to support, resources and enroll in early learning programs

HEALTHY DEVELOPMENT

- Provide developmental "check up" screenings including social-emotional throughout the community, such as food pantries, laundromats, EPEL website, etc...
- Connect healthcare partners to early childhood community resources to Meet Families Where They Are
- Sponsor *Learning on the Go* Summer programs and neighborhood pop-ups to connect families and children with resources to develop Kindergarten readiness skills

EARLY LEARNING

- Distribute Getting Ready for Kindergarten calendars in Spanish and English
- · Increase the number of young children receiving services
- Partner with early childhood programs to support training and technical assistance of early childhood professionals that will increase the quality of early experiences provided
- Provide quarterly child care director and family care provider network meetings to connect, share information, and work together on solutions




